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Reflections on What is Important in Life

~ As written by Reverend Jerry K. Hirano in the December issue of Buddhist Thoughts

*On Friday evening you stole the life of an exceptional person, the love of my life, the mother of my son,
but you will not have my hatred.*

*I don't know who you are and I don't want to know, you are dead souls. If this God for whom you kill blindly
made us in his image, every bullet in the body of my wife is a wound in his heart.*

*So no, I will not give you the satisfaction of hating you. You want it, but to respond to hatred with anger would
be to give in to the same ignorance that made you what you are.*

*You would like me to be scared, for me to look at my fellow citizens with a suspicious eye, for me to sacrifice my
liberty for my security. You have lost.*

*I saw her this morning. At last, after nights and days of waiting. She was as beautiful as when she left on Friday
evening, as beautiful as when I fell head over heels in love with her more than 12 years ago.*

Of course I am devastated with grief, I grant you this small victory, but it will be short-lived.

*I know she will be with us every day and we will find each other in heaven
with free souls which you will never have.*

*Us two, my son and I, we will be stronger than every army in the world. I cannot waste any more time on you as
I must go back to [my son] who has just woken from his sleep.*

*He is only just 17 months old, he is going to eat his snack just like every other day, then we are going to play
like every other day and all his life this little boy will be happy and free.*

Because you will never have his hatred either."

~Antoine Leiris in response to the death of his wife Helen Muyal-Leiris

On November 13, 2015 in Paris, France, 130 people were murdered. One of these was Helen Muyal-Leiris, whose husband wrote this letter in response to her murder. There is so much information on the internet, from Facebook, Google, MSN, etc. I usually read some and just ignore the rest. After the Paris murders, I felt, "Here we go again." Another senseless murder by a rage filled group of fanatics. Yes, I know that human beings had lost their lives. However, to an extent, all this news and information desensitizes me to the horror and suffering of the world. This letter by Antoine Leiris to his beloved Helen, put a much more human face on this murder.

Usually much of the rhetoric of terrorism and the reporting of such atrocities is filled with thoughts of rage and retribution, how one group will respond in violence to the violence that has been committed upon them or their friends and family. The recent murder by a fanatic at the Planned Parenthood clinic in Colorado has brought

about a hate filled debate between Republican Presidential candidates and the President about who is to blame for this killing? This is a perfect example of hate creating hate.

This letter was so different. Antoine expressed his grief, he admits to it, *“Of course I am devastated with grief, I grant you this small victory, but it will be short-lived.”* However, he denies the rage and hate, *“So no, I will not give you the satisfaction of hating you. You want it, but to respond to hatred with anger would be to give in to the same ignorance that made you what you are.*

You would like me to be scared, for me to look at my fellow citizens with a suspicious eye, for me to sacrifice my liberty for my security. You have lost.”

The Buddha spoke in a similar manner in the Dhammapada:

He abused me, He laughed at me, He struck me.

Thus one thinks, and so long as one cherished such thoughts ones anger continues.

Anger will never disappear, as long as thoughts of resentment

Are cherished in the mind.

Anger will disappear just as soon as thoughts of

Resentment are forgotten

As many of you who have read my articles through the years know, I love the Holiday season. When I say Holiday season I mean from Thanksgiving through our Jodo Shinshu Ho'onko in January. I realize every day of the year should be a time of Thanksgiving and reflection. However, our lives are like the Internet, filled with so much information and stimulation that we cannot process it all. We often forget about what is important in life, we are too busy, paying bills, running errands, even watching our favorite T.V. shows. At least during the Holiday season, maybe we can take time, to think of what is really important in our lives.

For our Christian friends, they are reminded of what is important in life, by the birth of Jesus Christ, whose parents were accepted in by strangers in a strange land, to become the savior of the world, because of his message of love over hate. As it was said to have been proclaimed by angels at his birth, *“Peace on Earth, Goodwill towards man.”* I have always believed, that whatever occasion, whether Christian, Buddhist, Muslim, I would try to use that occasion to remind me of what is important in life.

To me, the importance of life, is found in love and gratitude. This tragedy that had befallen the life of Antoine Leiris, is a gift to me, to remind me of how hate cannot be overcome with hate. That only love and gratitude, can bring about Peace. Antoine Leiris, poem of love is the same message proclaimed by angels, *“Peace on Earth, Goodwill towards man.”* His letter also teaches me the importance of impermanence. That now is the time to tell those that I love, *“I love you.”* To tell my friends, *“Thank you.”*

On behalf of Carmela, Kacie, Taylor, Miso and myself, I would like to thank each of you for all that you do for us. It is my deepest wish on this holiday season that you will be able to talk with your loved ones to tell them how much you love and appreciate them and that you may even be able to love or at least respect your enemies. When I write my December article I usually like to use some type of Christmas saying, however, this year, my friend Rev. Marvin Harada had written an aspiration for each of us, after the Paris killings and I would like to close with that wishing each of you a wonderful Holiday season.

Ice fishing at MANTUA RESERVOIR – note new location**

Mantua Reservoir Info - Mantua is 23 miles from the Church (about 30 minutes driving time).

Decided to try Mantua this year because it freezes earlier than Pineview and because of the variety of fish

- **Perch** (limit of 50); **Bluegill** and **Sunfish** (limit of 50 in combination); **Trout** (limit of 4); **Largemouth** and **Smallmouth Bass** (limit of 6 in combination)

*For the kids - I'll be awarding prizes for the biggest fish in length of each species. If you catch a big fish, come see me for measuring!!!

When

1. On the ice at 7:30am. If you want to carpool, meet at the Church by 7:00am.
2. We'll fish until about 1:00pm and plan on lunch at 2:00pm.
3. If you can't make it fishing, please feel free to come to the Church for lunch!!!!

How to Get There

1. Travel up I-15 North to exit 362 (the first Brigham City exit).
2. Exit freeway at exit 362. There are several freeway signs designating this exit ("US 89/91 North", "Logan/Utah State", "1100 South").
3. Travel through the two signal lights and continue on US 89/91.
4. Go past the 1st Mantua exit.
5. Exit to the right at the 2nd Mantua exit.
6. Turn right at Stop sign on MAIN STREET and travel south about ¼ mile.
7. Parking lots will be on your left. There are two lots – a small one near the restrooms (building with red roof) and a larger lot slightly before.
8. Walk up the dike to access the reservoir. Look for the red, fishing tent with the red University of Utah banner.

What to Bring

1. Fishing License – If you are 12 years old or older you need a license to fish. Buy your license at any license agent (egs: Sportsman's Warehouse, K-Mart, etc.) or on-line at <http://wildlife.utah.gov>.
 - a. 365-day (12 to 13 years of age) - \$5
 - b. 365-day (14 to 17 years of age) - \$16
 - c. 365-day, resident (18 years of age or older) - \$34
 - d. 3-day (all ages) - \$16
2. Warm Clothes (dress in layers) – gloves, hat, snow pants and especially insulated (preferably waterproof) boots.
3. Optional –
 - a. Something to sit on – small, collapsible camp chairs work well.
 - b. Drinks and snacks.
 - c. Change of clothes (just in case).

What to be Careful of

1. Be very careful when walking on the ice - it can be very slippery. Also be aware of drilled ice holes – they can be as large as 10 inches in diameter and you don't want to step in them.
2. Don't worry if you hear the ice crack...that means the ice is safe (really!!!)
3. Carefully observe all traffic laws in and around Mantua – the local police can be overzealous and you don't want to get a ticket!!!

Our guest speaker was Reverend Marvin Harada. These three representatives along with our own Reverend Hirano are the core running force from BCA! It was a true privilege to host them at Mountain States this year!

Our first morning started in the dark, the area had a major power outage and our departure was delayed until we could get coffee and food. Once we started, it was a great day! We had every age you could guess with us, from the youngest of about 6 to our wonderful Reverend Masami H. at 93. Several of our group chose to enjoy the Moab Celtic Festival's, "Scots on the Rocks" Scottish games. Blain is yielding a traditional sword that, as you may be able to tell, was very heavy.



The rest of our group headed to Arches National Park and had an amazing hike to Moab's Delicate Arch.

We returned to the Moab Valley Inn and had a workshop with Reverend Harada as our guest speaker. His subject was Reflections; he showed several clips from the old movie "Ikiru". The main character, Watanabe-San, realizes that he cannot bear to die, not because he is afraid to die, but because he realizes he has never done anything meaningful with his life. As the movie goes on he finds a way to do something meaningful and fulfilling. Reverend Harada shared two poems with us to help understand the Nembutsu way of life is just what Watanabe-San realized.
